# NEWTON'S PLACE

## Update

COMMUNITY | HERITAGE | TOWN

*Newton Abbot Town Council is still here for you.*

SINCE the outbreak of the Corona virus, events have moved very fast. At the time of writing we're all living with restrictions and challenges we never thought possible. How long the situation will last none of us knows. All we can do is keep on top of the information coming from the Government and observe the rules.

In the meantime, what does it mean for Newton's Place and the services provided by Newton Abbot Town Council?

As you may know, staff and councillors moved out of the old Town Hall in Devon Square on March 18. The plan was to set up in Newton's Place – the former St Leonard's Church in Wolborough Street – and work behind closed doors for a short while as we settled in and the final construction worked continued.

But the health and safety of us all – and this includes the public – means, for the foreseeable future, we are now operating from our various home addresses. All the phone lines and emails have been diverted to the right people – **YOU CAN STILL GET IN TOUCH** – and we're in regular contact with each other.

Please bear with us as we try to make these new arrangements work as smoothly as possible.

We will be making alternative arrangements for council meetings – such as holding them online – but with Teignbridge District Council and other authorities having cancelled all but 'essential' meetings it is likely we'll need to hold fewer meetings ourselves. We will make every effort to inform residents about how they can still be part of the democratic process. All meetings will be publicised in advance with advice on how to take part, so watch this space.

What we can promise is that we will do everything in our power to deliver Newton's Place as soon as is safe and humanly possible.

When the Mid-Devon Advertiser broke news of the delayed opening on March 20 the story made the front page. We take this as an indication of just how much the community is awaiting the arrival of its new facility. Your disappointment is not lost on us and we feel it just as acutely. We have worked incredibly hard in the last few years to make the dream a reality and want nothing more than to deliver. And we will!

*'It is with very heavy hearts that we have taken these steps but feel it is absolutely necessary given the current national and international effort to halt the spread of the coronavirus.'*

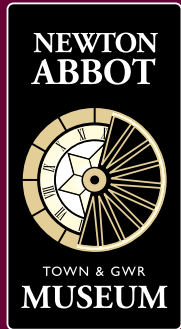

*'By working together, we can minimise the impact of this dreadful virus. We must remain hopeful and positive, looking for the best within ourselves and cherishing those we love and care for.'*

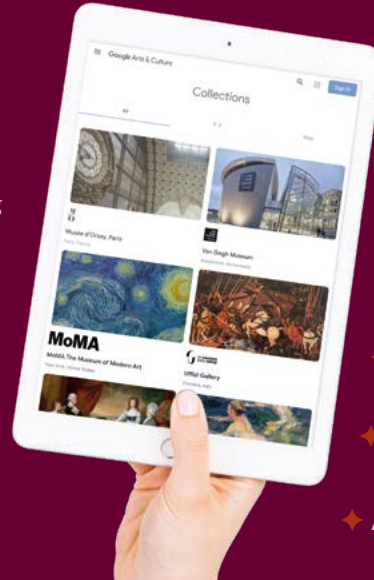

## TWO GAMES TO TEST YOUR POWERS OF OBSERVATION AND DESCRIPTION...

Here are two great ways to keep your minds sharp – and have fun at the same time! For both games, all you need is a tray or large plate, a blindfold and around 10 – 20 small household objects – anything will do, as long as it'll fit on the tray.

### Kim's Game

Named after the eponymous hero from Rudyard Kipling's novel *Kim*, who plays the game as part of his training to become a spy, this is ideal for two or more people.

- 1 Without the other(s) watching, one person (the collector) gathers objects of their choosing and places them on the tray. The tray is then shown to the other players for twenty seconds before being taken away.
- 2 The collector removes one item from the tray before replacing it in front of the other players, who then have to deduce which item is missing.



- 3 If the missing object is correctly identified, a point is scored and the collector replaces the item on the tray before repeating step 2. If an incorrect answer is given, a new collector is chosen and the game begins again. The winner is the player with the most points after a set number of rounds.

### Hands & Ears

A guessing game, for two or more teams of two people, that will hone your senses and develop co-operational skills.

- 1 Members of Team A sit back-to-back, one as 'Ears', the other as 'Hands'. Hands is blindfolded.
- 2 Team B secretly selects five objects and gives them to Team A's blindfolded player (Hands).
- 3 Hands is given one minute to describes each object; Ears must guess what the objects are before the time is up. A point is scored for each correctly identified object.
- 4 Teams swap roles – most points wins!

Have you ever heard of our fantastic, world famous, 18th century inventor and diver, John Lethbridge? He lived in Newton Abbot during the 1700s. Lethbridge invented a 'diving-engine' and tested it in his pond in his back garden. He then went on to become a very successful 'silver-fisher'. He dived on shipwrecks, salvaging silver and the cargoes of the East India Company's wrecked ships all over the world.

# Chancel be a fine thing!

If you look up in the former Chancel when you first visit Newton's Place, you are sure to be enchanted by the beautiful, painted ceiling that was carefully created in 1881, by a local and very talented artist, Vernon Benbow. Living for most of his life in Paignton he decorated a number of local churches in a style typical of the Victorian era, his paintings harking back to medieval religious decorations.

The ceiling is made up from a series of wooden boards that have a dark blue painted background with earth-red roundels that frame, firstly, a number of angels with golden halos and exquisite faces, each playing a different instrument. Secondly, a collection of gilded scrolls on which is written 'Alleluia', surrounded by plants that have religious significance and that are all mentioned in the bible - lilies, roses, grapes, bulrushes, pomegranates, Passion flowers, thistles and quince.

When staff at the Town Council and the Museum first saw the ceiling, all were very excited by the quality of the work, but, on closer inspection, were a little dismayed at the damage that had occurred over the years because of candle smoke and from leaks in the roof. Added to which an overall discolouration of the top layer of varnish meant that the, once beautiful, ceiling was in need of some TLC.

Enthusiastic volunteers from the museum set to work to write funding applications to pay for the restoration and conservation of such a significant body of painting. And.... success, a grant came from the Art Fund to pay a team of professional conservators from McNeilage Conservation to begin their specialised work, for which we are extremely grateful.

Over a period of a few months, initial inspection and analysis of the paintings were followed by careful cleaning and restoration work. The layers of dirt and accumulated soot from candles and incense burning were removed using chemicals and cotton swabs, and the cracks between the boards were repaired. An interesting discovery was the hand painted message from Vernon Benbow himself, proclaiming that he had painted the ceiling in honour of God. Other names etched into the beams were revealed of those who had worked on installing the ceiling and who had undertaken general maintenance, dating from 1876 and 1951. Next came the careful job of repainting small areas, using acrylic paints that were mixed to match the original colours. A fresh coat of varnish, to protect the panels for the future, was applied as the final task.

Now the paintings are conserved for future generations who visit Newton's Place and we are all to surely suffer slightly from sore necks as we gaze with wonder at the magnificent work of Vernon Benbow.





## Sound advice from the town clerk...

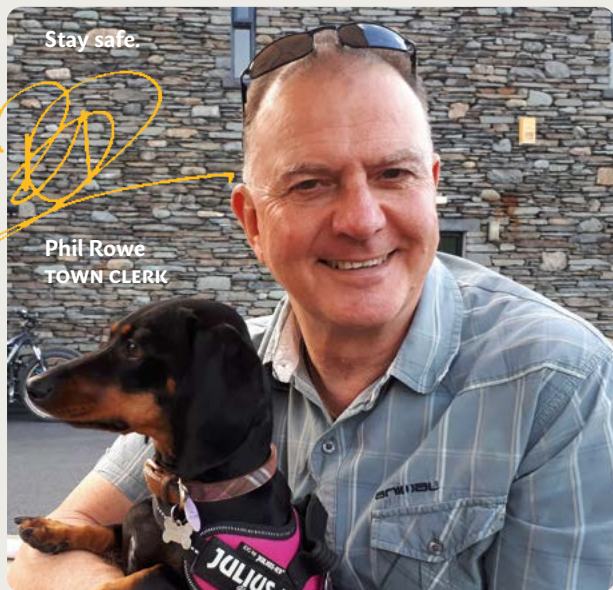
