Triumphant return

After a long association with Newton Abbot, HMS Triumph will exercise its Freedom of the Town on Saturday 1st April. The event will consist of a parade of the HMS Triumph ships company contingent accompanied by the TS Ramehead Sea Cadet Volunteer Band.

The parade will start from Victoria Gardens in Newton Abbot town centre at 2pm and parade through the pedestrianised part of the town through to Wolborough Street. At Wolborough Street there will be a presentation of the freedom scroll by Phil Rowe (town clerk) and the Mayor of Newton Abbot, Cllr Carol Bunday, to Commander Shaun Southwood who is kindly standing in for the Commanding Officer of HMS Triumph.

Following the ceremony there will be a VIP (invitees only) reception at Newton's Place, where the mayor will perform the official opening of this community building, museum and council offices.

HMS Triumph is Newton Abbot's affiliated submarine. She is of the Trafalgar Class, the seventh and final example of her type, and the tenth vessel (and second submarine) to bear the name. The first HMS Triumph was a 68-gun galleon built in 1561! As of 2023, she is the Navy's nineteenth nuclear-powered hunter-killer submarine and the last boat of her class remaining in service.










The role of HMS Triumph is extremely varied, from tactical strike duties to fleet protection and intelligence gathering. Commissioned in 1991, she has participated in the war in Afghanistan and Operation Ellamy in Libya. In 1993 she sailed to Australia, travelling 41,000 miles unsupported - the longest solo deployment ever completed by a Royal Navy submarine

Museum News

WITH DR CHARLOTTE DIXON (CURATOR) AND KATIE PETLEY-JONES (CURATORIAL ASSISTANT)

A big thank you to all our visitors who came to the museum last year. Between January and December 2022 we welcomed over 12,500 people! We really value your support and know how important it is to make sure there is something new to see when we welcome you back. With around 16,000 objects in the

collection, changing the displays is a great opportunity to share more stories surrounding the history of our town.

Change of circumstance

Until recently, there was little evidence of any Roman influence in Devon beyond Exeter, but in 2007 two metal detectorists discovered coins at a site in Ipplepen, challenging perceptions on the extent of Roman activity in the south west and prompting a series of archaeological surveys and excavations run by the University of Exeter, the Portable Antiquities Scheme, the British Museum and Devon County Council.

The project revealed Iron Age roundhouses, evidence of a town pre-dating Roman presence in the area. Of particular significance was the presence of around 150 Roman coins and Roman pottery suggesting that an exchange in goods and money was taking place here on a larger scale than known in other villages in Britain at this time.

This site is invaluable to our understanding of Romano-British history and we are delighted to be exhibiting a selection of the incredible Roman coins, kindly on loan to us from Torquay Museum.

NEW LOOK FOR THE COSTUME CASE

In museums we are constantly faced with the challenge of showcasing our wonderful objects for public viewing whilst also conserving the collection. Light is one of the conditions we monitor and, to ensure our costume collection isn't exposed to too much brightness, we change the display every year.

During our winter closure we carefully packed up the 18th century gentleman's sleeved waistcoat and bicorn hat on display in our costume area and set to work on installing a new display around the theme of 'childhood'. One of our volunteers worked on making new mount supports for a 1950s child's corduroy coat and a 1960s handmade smock dress. This display is supported by a charming doll's house that was hand made in the 1920s (currently on loan) and a collection of vintage toys.

Final piece of the Sandford Orleigh puzzle rediscovered?

Last year we had a surprise visit from a gentleman who donated a wooden panel believed to be from the Sandford Orleigh carvings that now reside at the museum. Sandford Orleigh House, the former home of the carvings, was built by industrialist George Templer in the 1830s. The wealthy landowner, whose family made its fortune in the granite and clay industries, was also warden of St Mary's Chapel in the town.

According to a contemporary newspaper article, Templer had some of the chapel's ancient oak carvings removed and, along with sections taken from similar structures, reconfigured at his new home to create a large and magnificent fire surround.



In the mid 20th century the house was used as a private school and following its closure in the 1970s a former student, hearing that the fire surround was being dismantled, wanted to help preserve it and was given a panel to assist his search for a new home for the carvings.

Luckily for Newton Abbot, no one could accommodate the huge structure, so it remained stored at Sandford Orleigh House until we were able to rescue it in 2014. Meanwhile, the orphaned panel was displayed in the donor's house as a treasured memento of his school days until it was donated to the museum.

With the new acquisition now on display alongside the intricately carved oak centrepiece, visitors can judge for themselves whether or not this is indeed the missing panel that once occupied the blank space at the bottom left hand side of the fire surround!



Royal Commemoratives from the Torquay and South Devon Potteries

FOR

ROYAL



In celebration of the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, Torquay Pottery Collectors Society are putting together a unique chance to view a range of local pottery that have links to commemorative events through history. These wonderful pieces will be displayed within the museum for you to come and see and it is free to visit!

It is a reflection of the importance that the monarchy has always played in national life that Britain produced so many souvenirs to commemorate royal events – more than anywhere else in Europe.

During the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries commissioning royal commemoratives remained the prerogative of the well to do: however, the Industrial Revolution brought forth opportunities for a much wider market.

The establishment of the Watcombe Terracotta Company in 1869, the Torquay Terracotta Company in 1875 and the Aller Vale Art Pottery in 1881 coincided with the period of renewed glory in patriotism and the Empire, and these South Devon potteries produced a number of royal commemoratives for the prominent royal events.

This exhibition, which runs from Saturday 10th June through to Thursday 6th July, celebrates a range of pieces made by these

local potteries. Often these local pieces contained more handapplied work than the better-known transfer decorated Staffordshire ware, so it is an exhibit not to be missed.


St. Leonard's Tower opening








Out & About &

Hidden Treasures


WITH KATE GREEN, COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER FOR NEWTON'S PLACE

Did you know that most museums can only show about 10% of the collection of objects that they hold? Newton Abbot Museum looks after around 16,000 objects but we can only show about 300 at a time in the museum itself. That means that we have a lot of wonderful artefacts in our museum store.

Our project this spring, called *What's in Store*?, aims to share many unseen items from our collection, but through the eyes of young, talented artists in the town. We have shared a range of objects with pupils from local schools and they have interpreted each object using various artistic media. Their wonderful artworks will be on show throughout April in our Your Space cabinet and community area in the museum. Pop in and have a peek at hidden objects via the artworks.

> This painted wooden Polish folk art figure of a musician and dog was carved by a known artist near Warsaw. Woodcarving was once a popular way of depicting religious and secular themes in Poland.

All of the artwork featured here was created by students from Glendinning Academy, Wolborough School and Highweek School.



Crafted from beads made from camel dung, this little bag was owned by Dr Mapleton, medical officer of health for Newton Abbot Urban and District Councils from 1890 to 1932.

brightly coloured traditional Polish headdress was given to the museum in 2003 for an exhibition celebrating Newton Abbot's connections with the Polish people and their culture.








Taking place on the first Saturday of every month, our free Make & Create family workshops provide an opportunity for families to have fun together, be creative and discover local history, too.



From 4 May, voters in England will need to show photo identification (ID) to vote at polling stations in local elections, Police and Crime Commissioner elections, UK parliamentary byelections and recall petitions. From October, photo ID will also be mandatory in general elections.

This follows the government's decision to require voters to show photo ID when voting in person. A wide range of photo ID will be accepted at polling stations including:

- Free Voter Cards, provided by local authorities
- Various concessionary travel passes
- Ministry of Defence identity cards
- Photocard parking permits issued as part of the Blue Badge scheme
- Driver's licences
- PASS cards
- Passports

s Details of all current photo ID options are set out on the electoral commission website: electoralcommission.org.uk



People who don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, but are registered to vote, can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate on line. The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate for the May local elections is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April.

Paper application forms will be available from our electoral services team and in addition to information on its website, the electoral commission has also set up a helpline on **0800 328 0280**. Those not wishing to show photo ID when voting can apply for a postal vote.



What do local councils do?

Your local (parish and town) council has overall responsibility for the well-being of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- ✦ Delivery of services
- Improving quality of life for residents
- ✦ Giving communities a democratic voice

Local councils run numerous services, depending on the size of the council. Many you will see day-to-day, but some are less known. These include introducing solar panels, setting up dementia-friendly groups, organising community buses, creating neighbourhood plans, implementing suitable housing, establishing youth projects, managing allotments and open spaces, maintaining footpaths, public seating and litter bins.

Becoming a local councillor

Local councillors can be voices for the community and make a real difference. They are community champions, investing time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood.

Local councillor responsibilities fall into three main categories:

- ♦ Decision-making
- Monitoring
- ✦ Getting involved locally

Local councillors attend to local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with district and borough councils to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.

Can I stand for election?

To stand for election to a local council you must be:

- A citizen of the UK, Commonwealth, Republic of Ireland; or another member state of the European Union
- ✦ At least 18 years old
- An elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months occupied land or other premises in the area the local council serves (as owner or tenant); or work in the area local council serves (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the local council boundary
