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Gift of life for Buckland & Milber

THREE new defibrillators worth almost £4,000 have been installed in Buckland and Milber, Newton Abbot. The lifesaving machines, which cost £1,300 each and require no training to operate, have been funded by Newton Abbot Hospital League of Friends.

Located at Chesters Café in Haldon Rise, Shaldon Road Methodist Church in Moorland View, and St Luke's Church, Laburnum



Road, the equipment is available 24 hours a day and brings the total number of defibrillators in the area to four with one having been previously installed at The Buckland Centre.

Their need was identified by Cllr Mike Ryan of Newton Abbot Town Council, who said: 'I learned some time ago that if the nearest defibrillator is more than about 400 yards away then it might be too far to help someone's life being saved.

'I tried several ways to get more but without success, so I approached Dan Osborne of the Jay's Aim charity which supplies the devices and learned that the three would cost £3,900.

'I suggested that the Newton Abbot Hospital League of Friends, of which I'm president, might consider helping out and so Dan wrote to the League and I'm

very pleased to say that the committee agreed to fully fund all three.

Newton Abbot Hospital League of Friends

Newton Abbot Hospital League of Friends recently presented Albany Surgery, Newton Abbot, with a hyfrecator - a low-powered medical apparatus used in electrosurgery on conscious patients to destroy tissue and to stop bleeding during minor surgery.

The Newton Abbot branch of the League of Friends will be celebrating its 74th anniversary later this year, having supported both Newton Abbot hospitals; the first being built in 1898 in East Street, and the second on West Golds Road, which was completed in 2009.

The league is made up entirely of volunteers who raise money and spend time at the hospital, undertaking tasks such as 'meet and greet' in the main foyer and the physiotherapy department; wheeling the tea trolley, assisting with patient lunches, patient befriending, and the ever-popular sales tables, which is

Monies raised also include bequests in wills, which benefit many of the hospital departments, local GP surgeries, Rowcroft Hospice, and other local organisations with medical requests.



Although they are here for just a year, Lucy and India have some exciting plans for the museum, so why not pop by to say hello and discover what they are up to?





Footfall On The Rise!

Visitor numbers at Newton Abbot Museum continue to grow as the facility enters a second full year at its new location. In the first quarter of 2023 more than 3,600 people came through the doors at Newton's Place, up approximately 20 per cent on last year.

The museum's old site in Devon Square could expect a total of approximately 2,500 visitors in an entire year. The numbers have cheered staff who oversaw the six year transition to the seven-figure new site.

'When Newton Abbot Town Council, our main funders, decided to buy the former St Leonard's Church it was a bold move and potentially not without risks,' said curator Dr Charlotte Dixon.

'The total cost of buying, converting, restoring and conserving the Grade Two listed building – carried out during a global pandemic don't forget – was around £2.5 million.

'For that the town now has a fantastic new museum, community rooms and accessible council offices.

'And thanks to careful financial management, and support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund who provided almost half the cost, not a single penny was added to council tax bills to achieve this great result.

'Now our visitor figures confirm that people really enjoy coming here, viewing superb displays such as the Ipplepen Roman coin collection, on loan from Torquay Museum until March next year, which we know is attracting visitors in its own right.

'We're also staging plenty of outreach work plus activities for schools and families, and ensuring we have the necessary skills and facilities to make visits enjoyable for everyone, no matter what their needs.'

With Dr Dixon now on maternity leave, colleagues have welcomed India Jolly (pictured right) who will assume the curator role for a year.

'I'm very excited, there are lots of incredibly interesting projects I'm looking forward to taking on and hopefully I'll come up with some new ones as well,' said India, who previously managed Liskeard and District Museum

'The outreach programme is brilliant and it's just great to get the community involved with its museum

'It's going to be a wonderful year and I look forward to meeting everyone.'




The Votes are Cast

Newton Abbot Town Council's line-up has been decided, following the public vote held across the five wards of the town on May 4th.

A total of twelve councillors were elected, representing Bradley, Bushell, and Buckland & Milber wards. With three wards being uncontested, six vacancies remain within College (4), Brunel(1) and Bradley (1). Co-option procedures are underway to restore the council to its full compliment of 18 members as soon as possible.

Helping to maintain the council's political neutrality, our new members are drawn from a wide demographic with a balanced mix of declared affiliations to different political parties. Their primary objective is to serve our town to the best of their abilities. campaigning for the rights of residents and businesses alike.

Perhaps we have been spoilt over the past couple of years, when spring and summer seemed to arrive together. We have had to wait considerably longer to see the sun and feel some warmth this year. We were hoping that May, with its unusual set of three bank holidays might prove to be a bit of a scorcher, but sadly we had to make do with cold, wind and rain; and yet more rain. On the bright side, it is hoped that the hosepipe ban might be lifted soon!

The unseasonal weather did not stop us celebrating the Coronation of King Charles. A Saturday of live music and crowning within our own 'throne room' in the Clock Tower, was followed by a hugely successful Sunday 'Party in the Park,' which families thoroughly enjoyed. It was great to see the whole park in use and lovely for the town council to provide an event for hard pressed families, which did not involve 'forking out' in any other sense than getting the picnic basket down from the loft. I know that our events

coordinator at the town council, buoyed up by the great feedback, is looking at perhaps making this an annual event.

We have just celebrated the success of our first Classic Car Show. The day dawned with perfect blue skies and welcome sunshine – vital ingredients to encourage classic car owners to bring their vehicles out for an airing. It was great to see all our pedestrianised spaces filled with gorgeous classic motors and fantastic to see the town busier than I have seen it in over a decade! Thank you so much to Teignbridge Classics; both the committee and members, for putting on such a professional and enjoyable show. We have something on in the town centre nearly every Saturday and so I hope that this might further encourage you to take a trip into town and support local shops, eateries and businesses.

It's fantastic to be able to tell visitors that Newton Abbot has quite a few businesses which other towns have lost over the years. I call these our 'hens' teeth,' and they include: an equestrian outfitter, a motorcycle shop and domestic appliance specialists; a fishmonger



and two superb local butchers; a haberdasher and a clothing alterations specialist.

We have a record shop and an audio specialist outlet; a picture framer, watch and clock specialists and two independent bookshops. We also have a huge independent department store. When you look at these alongside our fantastic array of mainly independently run cafés, pubs, bars and restaurants, hairdressers, barbers and beauty specialists, it is hard to understand those who sometimes tell me that Newton Abbot has nothing to offer!! We also have superb charity shops, which are always buzzing with shoppers and which play a vital role enabling recycling, upcycling and repurposing, so essential

in the reduction of carbon.



We also have BANKS!!! I speak to other place managers on a regular basis and I know that many of them are struggling with the challenge of not having a single bank or building society within their town.

Did you know that Austins will be celebrating its centenary next year? That is a fantastic achievement, but no surprise really, given the constant investment which has taken place in the Austins properties and the business in general. Over the years we saw House of Fraser and Debenhams 'make do and mend' and many of their shops became threadbare, leaky and generally dilapidated. Not a great retail experience... It's perhaps not surprising therefore that those businesses failed and have now left huge tracts of empty commercial property blighting the heart of many a town and city centre.

Newton Abbot has a proud tradition of independent business, with over 50% of the town centre independently run. I was pleased to accompany our last mayor, Cllr Carol Bunday, as she cut the ribbon at many new business openings over the last 18 months. You may have seen work being carried out on a few empty properties in the town as new businesses give town centre trading a go – and I do hope that you will continue to support them.

Allotment Association – Planting for Life

The year 2020 will go down in history as one where civilisation realised that the very thing we treasure the most, our planet, is being destroyed through our own actions. This applies most of all to our insect life, which we have sprayed with a cocktail of chemicals for the last fifty years to try to control, or even eradicate, them completely. We have not cared that these creatures, at the very bottom of the food chain, are what keeps so many other species alive, including us!

We need them to pollinate all of the various crops that we depend on to survive as a species. Albert Einstein is often misquoted as saying that without insects, mankind could only survive seven years. What he actually said was that if you remove insects from the natural world then you lose over 100,000 plants – plants that are reliant on pollinating insects.

Thankfully, Newton Abbot & District Co-operative Allotment Association (NADCAA) saw the problems coming and consulted Newton Abbot Town Council about taking measures to combat the issues. As a responsible landlord to NADCAA, we agreed to allow all

Today the benefits of the last 12 years' work have won NADCAA recognition from Devon Wildlife Trust as well as the town council.

Recent surveys showed that ponds created for wildlife contained natives smooth, palmate and the endangered greater crested newt. Toads, frogs and their tadpoles were also recorded along with common pipistrelle bats. During the survey tawny owls were heard, and for the first time in many years there are hedgehogs back on every field. Bird and bat boxes have been put up and are in use, and keen bird watchers have recorded over 40 species on the fields in the last year. The ponds have attracted many species of dragonflies and damselflies, and there has also been an increase in the number of moths, butterflies, ladybirds and grass snakes, along with slow worms. When it comes to the environment, the association and its members, are proud to be ticking every box.

At a meeting with Devon Wildlife Trust, CEO Harry Barton commented that allotments are "essential green corridors", allowing wildlife to move across towns where very little green space remains. NADCAA was also behind a joint project to launch the Allotment Wildlife Awareness Award for members who are looking

after nature on their allotments throughout the whole of Devon.

members of the association to turn 25% of their plot over to bio-diversity, specifically for growing plants for pollinating insects and to create habitats for animals that would be good for the allotments, like frogs, which predate slugs and snails, cutting out the need for slug pellets.

In addition, volunteers and members of the notfor-profit NADCAA have created wildlife areas on each of the five fields it currently manages for the town council, all funded through members' contributions, donations, plus some small grants. The members of this 100-year-old organisation passed resolutions at their 2021 AGM to cease the use of pesticides that are harmful to nature.
