

Speedwatch aims

Thanks to the Community Speed Watch initiative, residents of Newton Abbot have been able to take a proactive role in raising awareness of the dangers of speeding by encouraging drivers to take responsibility for their actions.

The scheme enables volunteers, working under a group coordinator, to monitor traffic movement and relay information to the council and the police. This helps us to make informed decisions on how to improve public safety for both road users and pedestrians without over burdening our police resources or having to meet the cost of third-party statistical surveys.

Recent roadside sessions with the speed-gun have had a noticeable effect on driver behaviour, with the highly visible presence of our volunteers often being just enough to provide that little reminder to ease off the accelerator pedal.

However, despite the majority of drivers observing the limits and displaying a sensible attitude to urban motoring, speeds of almost 100mph have been recorded in a Newton Abbot street where the limit is 30mph.

The shocking figures were detected in St Marychurch Road, captured on portable equipment, provided by Newton Abbot Town Council with a grant from the Police and Crime

Commissioner, after residents expressed concerns about road safety.

It has prompted hope of new permanent speed cameras meaning those who break the rules there could face hefty fines or driving bans.

The VASS – vehicle activated speed signs – were initially operational in St Marychurch Road between June 1 and July 3 of last year and recorded more than 20,000 vehicles exceeding 35mph and 119 drivers topping 60mph.

Additionally, during a second period of data gathering between December 8 and January 2, more than 22,000 drivers ignored the 30mph limit and some terrifying speeds of 89.05, 89.37 and 99.24mph being detected.

During a Speedwatch session in Ashburton Road on Sunday February 4, Speed Detection Officer Dave Burrows of Devon and Cornwall Police slammed the behaviour.

to boost road safety

'It's disgraceful, it's unforgivable,' he said.

'At that sort of speed, 100mph, your covering nearly 150ft of road surface per second.

'I've spent the last 30 years dealing with serious and fatal road accidents, I'm an experienced collision investigator, and at that speed the occupants of a car or anyone else wouldn't stand a chance.'

The man responsible for much of Newton Abbot's Speedwatch activity is former mayor, Cllr Mike Joyce. He and his team of volunteers have spent several years supporting the police.

'Ninety-nine miles an hour in a 30 zone; that is frightening,' he said.



'It scares me to death, to think someone could be doing that speed. But the positive result of all the statistics we've sent to the police is that county highways have said they're going to recommend installing a static camera in St Marychurch Road.

'There'd be no need for this if people abided why the speed limits, they're there for a reason. I still don't understand why people don't get that.

'But it's good news that our efforts are being rewarded and the problem taken seriously.

'We look forward to more success stories elsewhere in town such as Ashburton Road and Torquay Road where residents have also expressed concerns.'





YOUR REGULAR ROUND-UP FROM INDIA JOLLY (CURATOR) AND LUCY COKES (CURATORIAL ASSISTANT)

During winter closure, Assistant Curator Lucy has gone back to her book and paper conservation roots to repair some of our delicate items.

Advertising pamphlets for Pearks' Tea and Butter Store and a Bryant & May branded Lucy started with writing a report of the current condition of the objects and taking photos. She is using Japanese paper and wheat-starch paste to support the weakened areas, and had dyed some new paper to replace some of the missing paper on the matchbox.

It is hoped that these repairs will stabilise the objects so they can be used in interpretation throughout the museum in the future.

New Year, New Exhibitions

One of the biggest benefits of having our winter closure is that we get to change around some of our exhibitions. This gives us a chance to show items that have been in storage for a while, as well as showcasing some of the new donations we've been given. This year we've made three main changes: the hallway items, the New Acquisitions case, and the Costume Case.

In the hallway you can find items relating to Newton Abbot businesses. We have a boot from Ridgways and Hexter Humpherson bricks along with other items – but

you'll have to visit us in person to see what they are!

Our New Acquisitions case is all about Charles Lane Vicary's artwork. We recently received an item illustrated by Vicary that was originally given as a retirement gift, with caricatures of the recipient's colleagues alongside their signatures. This is now on display with other examples of Vicary's work.

Our Costume Case is the star of the show. Displaying two wedding dresses, it presents a clear illustration of the difference in bridal fashion from 1950 and 1970.

There have been many other smaller changes made throughout the museum, so come and check them out when you're next passing by!

I hope you enjoyed some of the many seasonal events which the town council put on last year, and thank you to everyone who shopped locally at Christmas. We had some brilliant BBC Spotlight coverage of the town centre and our final late night shopping event and received some lovely feedback from shoppers.



There are many more events and entertainments lined up for 2024, starting

with Easter fun and including our ever-popular summer Classic Car shows. Teignbridge Classics knows how to put on a good show, and we already have lots of interest from classic car owners, eager to show off their cherished vehicles.

The Liberty Sisters and The Hot House Combo will be returning this summer and the lads from local celebrity band, 3 Days of Wonder, will also be making an appearance at our September classic car show. Jazz and swing touring band Swervy World will be performing in Courtenay Street at the end of August, and I know there are many who will be thrilled to see them return after a little while away.

opening and just before Christmas I was delighted to welcome Sweet Dylemma and Yellow Umbrella Gifts, which took the remaining units on the ground floor of Pearl Assurance House. These unusual and attractive shops are such great additions to our portfolio of independent retailers.

Have you discovered Social Bar and Kitchen, which also opened before Christmas? This unique independent is the latest in our town's

fantastic line-up of eateries and can be found above Fulfords by St Leonard's Tower.

I would love to remind you here about Union Street (which links Courtenay Street with East Street in the town centre). This narrow street is teeming with little independent gems. Check out latest newcomer AJ Handmade & Yarn for exquisite accessories and crafts. I am also working with another of our award -winning independent businesses The Plot Catering Co and café, also based in Union Street, to establish a new monthly Sunday market in Courtenay Street. These will be on the first Sunday of every month – so easy to remember – with the first one taking place on 5th May. The Sunday Market will feature local produce and crafts, with scrumptious street food as well. If you're lucky enough to bag a space, on-street parking is free on Sundays, but it still only costs £1.10 to park all day in the TDC owned car parks, so why not put these dates in the diary now?

We have such an amazing array of local independent entrepreneurs; this will be an opportunity to showcase some of them and another opportunity for the community to shop locally. I do hope you will afford this new initiative the same great level of support that you've always shown to our town's business ventures.

Investing in the community

WHERE DOES YOUR COUNCIL TAX GO?

With the cost of living still rising, everyone strives to find the best value for money, whether it's your monthly heating bills or your weekly grocery shop, and it's our duty to ensure that all public funding – your money – is also spent wisely on local amenities and services.

Newton Abbot Town Council's proportion of your council tax is just $\pounds_{3.50}$ per week for a Band D property, but with the collective capital raised we're able to provide a wide range of benefits to the whole community, including:

- Our fabulous community building Newton's Place, which encompasses the town council offices, the museum, and the community rooms (which are available for hire to the public at very reasonable rates indeed).
- Our wonderful museum, housed within Newton's Place, which sings the song of Newton Abbot wonderfully while providing lots of free, fun, family activities!
- A fantastic and full annual programme of free events, including the Christmas festivities and classic car shows.
- Appointing a town development manager and community outreach worker for the continued benefit of the local community.

- Maintenance of 40+ public footpaths.
- Six allotment fields: Decoy, Bradley, Cookes, Blakes, Coach Road and Vicary's.
- The cutting of grass verges and visibility splays within Newton Abbot, (devolved from DCC).
- Provision of grants to local, grass roots organisations.
- Issuing Street Café Licences

- A small team of facilities maintenance operatives who work tirelessly to keep our streets clean and tidy.
- Emptying dog and litter bins at the Town Quay, Golden Lion Square and Victoria Gardens.
- Installation and maintenance of all street furniture throughout Newton Abbot town centre.
- Preservation of the historic St Leonard's Clock Tower and War Memorial.
- Planting floral displays (poles/baskets/ planters) within the town.
- Christmas illuminations throughout the town centre.
 - Access to our Town Quay, which is a haven of natural beauty and is filled with wildlife.
 - Newfoundland Way Public Conveniences (taken over from TDC).
 - Financial contributions towards the CCTV network within Newton Abbot town centre.
 - A Shop Front Improvement grant scheme for local businesses.
 - Safeguarding the green space of Victoria Gardens.
 - The community space that is Golden Lion Square.
 - Partly funding the Newton Abbot Community Interest Company.
